NATIVE HERE/PLANT FAIR REPORT

Native Here has new expanded hours through February. We'll stay open an extra hour on Saturdays, until 2 pm, and we'll also be open on Tuesdays from 12 pm – 3 pm. The extra weekday hours allow agencies, park staff, and landscape professionals, as well as home gardeners, more opportunities to buy plants during the prime planting season. The Tuesday hours will also allow us to better accommodate requests for contract-grown plants.

The Plant Fair, held October 18-19, was a big success and everything went very smoothly. The volunteers worked as a great team, or set of teams, with the leaders of each function able to orient their volunteers and interact with related functions. One innovation this year was an "information booth" at the fair entrance that helped customers get going with an expert guide. Although the nursery never seemed crowded, the Fair generated more revenue than in previous years. The Plant Fair is over but we still have a lot of plants left, including several All California natives. We have *Verbena*, *Sedum*, three varieties of *Ceanothus*, vine maples, and more.

Volunteer opportunities and ways to help the Nursery

• **Come buy plants throughout the winter.** As plants emerge from dormancy, species not available at the Plant Fair will be offered.


• **Volunteers are welcome at the Nursery to help replenish our stock.** We'll be seed sowing, transplanting, weeding, moving plants around, watering, and doing other tasks. If interested, show up when the nursery is open or email us at nativehere@ebcnps.org to arrange other volunteer times.

We accept used pots during our open hours on Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays. We reuse some of them and put the rest in the bin just outside the top gate. Anyone is welcome to take pots from this bin to use for their own planting projects.

Featured Plants for December 2008

This month we are featuring some of the plants from all over California that were offered at the Plant Fair that are still available for purchase:

Physocarpus capitatus (the common name of this member of the rose family is "ninebark") in the All California section differs from

the locally native one in that it is the prostrate form propagated originally from plants growing on San Bruno Mountain. This ninebark makes a great low-shrub groundcover. The twigs are very flexible so it is not bothered by dogs (or deer) running through it. Each plant has a spread of around three to four feet and grows to less than 3 feet high. While deciduous, new leaves have been known to appear within a week of the last leaf fall! Flowers and fruit are the same as the more typical ninebark, clusters of creamy white. Reasonably drought tolerant, this ninebark thrives on fog, is not fussy about soil and requires no supplemental watering after establishment in the Bay hills zone.

Ceanothus gloriosus var. *exaltatus* 'Emily Brown' is a mounding shrub to about four feet high. It is a strong, garden tolerant cultivar for both coastal and inland settings, has a broadly spreading habit. *Arctostaphylos bakeri* 'Louis Edmunds' (a manzanita) grows to be a medium to large shrub up to 10' in height. Dark bark, sage-green leaves, and clear pink flowers make it suitable as a focal point in a garden or as part of an informal screen.

FIELD TRIPS

Field trip to restoration sites in Dimond Canyon/Sausal Creek drainage

Date: Sunday, December 7

Time: 9:30-noon

Walk description: Join this last morning gathering of the December state CNPS meeting weekend to share successes and ongoing projects of the Friends of Sausal Creek. This group has partnered with the Oakland public schools and other local volunteer groups to reverse the spread of invasive plants and spread the growth and appreciation of native flora along this urban creek/public park interface. We will start from the horticultural native garden near the Dimond Park swimming pool and tot playlot, proceed to the second-growth redwoods along Monterey Road and Highway 13, and finish up at the remnant grassland area by the Friends of Sausal Creek Nursery. Because areas of housing break up the continuity of the trail, we will need to carpool to the second and third sites. E-mail janetgawthrop47@gmail.com if you can offer a ride, or need a ride. Also, if you only have time to attend the first part of the tour in Dimond Park before you have to leave, Dimond Park is accessible by #57 AC Transit bus from either Mills College (ask at the gate for the campus bus stop), or by the # 53 AC Transit bus from Fruitvale BART station.

How to get there: Exit 580 at Park in Oakland from either the north or south. Follow Park uphill and east from 580 until you reach El Centro, where you will turn right. El Centro is a small residential street, and the intersection has stop signs only for El Centro. Go downhill and south on El Centro about 2-3 blocks and look for parking where El Centro turns into the parking lot at the Dimond Park boundary. For bus riders, take AC Transit #57 north (toward San Francisco) until you reach Fruitvale Avenue. Get off the #57 at MacArthur and Dimond, which is one short block north of Fruitvale. Walk up to the end of Dimond, which is another park boundary, and on through the tot lot to the horticultural garden at your left. Sausal Creek runs just to the left of the tot lot. AC Transit buses have bicycle racks if needed.

Field trip to Huddart County Park to see Fetid Adder's Tongues

Date: Sunday, January 4, 2009

Time: 2:00 pm

Location: Huddart County Park, 1100 Kings Mountain Road, Woodside (San Mateo County) California. Meet in the parking lot just past the pay station.

Leader: David Margolies (510-654-0283, 510-393-1858 (cell) divaricatum@gmail.net)

Walk description: We will hike on the Crystal Springs Trail, where *Scoliopus bigelovii* (fetid adder's tongue, Liliacea) blooms in early January. (In most locations outside botanical gardens, it blooms in late January or early February.) This is a gentle trail, losing about 200 feet over about 1/2 mile to the creek. We will walk to the creek and then return the same way. It is unlikely that there will be any other flowers out this early, but the fetid adder's tongue's presence tells us that the new flower season has started. (Other plants out of flower will also be identified.) The area is second growth redwood and mixed evergreen forest.

How to get there: Go to Woodside (if in the East Bay, cross the Bay Bridge and get on I-280 south; otherwise get on 280 south). Take the 84 west/Woodside Road exit. Go west through the town of Woodside. Soon after the main part of the town, take a right onto Kings Mountain Road. The park entrance is on the right after a few miles. Go past the pay station into the main parking lot. We will meet there. Note that you must pay the parking fee even if the station is not staffed (use the envelopes provided).

Note: It will probably be muddy and may be raining. Be prepared. The walk will take place rain or shine.
